Towards the extremities for 2011

Our report is based on analysis of over 60,000 home movers during 2011 that provided us with 'from' and 'to' postcodes.

- The trend throughout 2011 is away from London and the South East, with many regions showing significantly lower numbers moving in than out.
- Once again, the West Country is proving a popular destination, with Torquay leading the pack and Truro, Exeter and Plymouth all registering significant influxes.
- Similarly, many areas of Scotland have proved desirable, with Galashiels, Kilmarnock, Inverness and Perth attracting more than their share of buyers.
- As in our previous reports, as a percentage of population, the people of Oxford move more in 2011 than anywhere else in the UK.

Rosemary Rogers, Director, reallymoving.com comments:

"Our research shows that during 2011 the South West claimed the highest % of movers into the region. Torquay, Truro and Exeter all appear in the top five results.

"Cities which retain their residents make a healthy mix across the UK: Sheffield, Chester and Newcastle all share the No.1 spot for residents staying within their postcode regions; which is a great reflection on the success of those cities."

Moves to the West Country and Scotland remain popular

As in our previous report in Q2 2011, the trend of people moving from London to smaller towns and cities continues, though it is slightly less pronounced when figures for the whole 12 months are viewed. Here we see that the geographically outer reaches of the UK in particular have experienced an influx of buyers, relative to the numbers moving out, with many areas from the West Country and Scotland featuring in the top 10.

In addition, Shrewsbury at number two, and Lincoln, Gloucester and Hereford, all demonstrate a movement away from the major conurbations.

Leaving many parts of London

At the other end of the scale, a quick glance at the table shows that areas of London make up most of the least popular on the list. Of the places listed in the table below, only Liverpool and Blackburn are not within the M25 area of London and its surroundings.

We're happy here! Postcode areas that retain their residents...

Sheffield and Newcastle retain their lead in terms of people choosing to stay within the area when they move. Newcomers to the top 10 include Chester, Birmingham and Gloucester, replacing Perth, Sheffield and Walsall, which moved down the rankings.

Population Mobility – areas with itchy feet

As in our last report, the people of Oxford are the biggest movers: there are 69% more moves per head of population than the national average. St. Albans, the second highest last time, is down to number three now, replaced by Reading.

However, percentages are noticeably lower than in the previous quarter, suggesting that the spread of moves is more evenly distributed nationwide than before.

No change here: the table shows that once again Belfast and Kilmarnock are the least active moving markets per % of population, and by a significant margin.

However, this time they have been joined by some areas that did not feature in our previous Migration Monitor report, namely Wigan, Paisley, Carlisle, Oldham and Halifax.

Notes to Editors

About the reallymoving.com Migration Monitor

The Migration Monitor is a quarterly report on home-moving trends in the UK, based on information entered by users of reallymoving.com. The Migration Monitor is based on data from registrations for quotes for moving services such as conveyancing, home removals and surveys in the second quarter (April - June) of 2011.

The data issued in this report is based on 20,494 registrations in the second quarter of 2011 for conveyancing, removals and surveys.

Table A measures the number of people requesting quotes for a move TO a particular postcode as a percentage of all moves FROM that postcode. These are ranked by this ratio to display the **most** popular destination postcode.

Table B measures the number of people moving TO a particular postcode as a percentage of all moves recorded to display the **least** popular destination postcode.

Tables C and D display the percentage of movers who are moving within the same postcode area. Table C shows the top-retaining areas and Table D shows the areas retaining the least number of residents.

Tables E and F display the percentage of residents who are moving either within their own postcode or moving from their postcode. **Table E** displays the regions that have very active residents who are keen to move in this quiet market, whilst **Table F** shows the regions with the fewest moves. Both these tables are calculated relative to the population per town city.
